REV. KAZ NAKATA A promise from the past to the present by the teaching of Amida Tathagata



Hello to all Fresno Betsuin Sangha Friends! We have only two more months until the year 2025! Time flies so quickly! In November, we observe Eitaikyo, which is one of Jodo Shinshu major services. Eitaikyo is a Japanese term, combined words of Ei, tai, and kyo.

'Ei' is perpetual, 'tai' is generations, and 'kyo' is sutra chanting. Basically, Eitaikyo means that we wish the chanting of

Sutras will continue at the temple perpetually. At Eitaikyo, we celebrate and pay respect to the lives of all Sangha members who helped and supported our Betsuin activities while they were alive. In the July Geppo article, I wrote about Eitaikyo, please read it again.

When I worked for the Sacramento Betsuin, I was also a 6th grade Dharma School teacher. In 2003, their Dharma School had more than 400 students from Pre-K to 12th Grade, and my 6th grade classroom was always filled with many students.

There was a girl in my class who did not like Mother's Day. When Mother's Day neared, the students were asked to write a letter to their mothers. It is because she had to listen to her friends chatting about the gifts they have given to their mothers that this girl did not like Mother's Day. As much as she wanted to write her mother a letter or to give her a gift, she no longer had a mother. You see, her mother died when this girl was in kindergarten.

She told me that each time she visited her mother in the hospital, her mother would pinky promise to never leave her alone. About a week later, the girl's grandmother came to her kindergarten class to pick her up before going to the hospital. Upon entering her mother's room, she saw her father was standing next to her bed with his head down. Although she was young, she felt something different. She rushed to the bed and screamed "mom!", while shaking her mother's body, but she did not reply. Then, her father came next to her and while holding her shoulder, said, "your mom just passed away. She told me to tell you that she is very sorry." The girl, while pounding her father's chest and crying, said, "No way! It's a lie! Mom promised not to leave me alone. I can't believe she leaves me alone." Her grandmother said "If you say that, your mother will be sad. Let's say goodbye to her", as if protecting her son, the girl's father. The girl lamented and thought to herself, "Mom, you are a liar. You promised me that you wouldn't die and leave me alone!"

When I assigned my Dharma School students to write a letter to their mother, this girl approached me and said, "Rev. Kaz, I don't want to write about it. I don't want to write it because my mom broke her promise to me and left me alone." She started crying and all the other students looked at us in surprise. I told her calmly "Your mom did not leave you alone." She was upset and said "No way Rev. Kaz, you are liar too. She promised me that she would not die. Everyone is a liar. I... I am alone." I looked around the classroom and said to all the students "I know this is very hard but please listen... Did your mom promise that she wouldn't die? I think she promised that she wouldn't leave you alone." She said, "these are same things to me." I said to her, "No, they are completely different. It's sad, but if we were born, we must die, and when we meet, we must part ways. This is the true teaching of the Buddha. But, when we die, we always return to our loved ones as fond memories. I heard your mom brought you to Dharma School when you were in kindergarten. I am sure that because she enjoyed and trusted our Jodo Shinshu and Betsuin, she chose Dharma School as a place for your personal development. Your mom became a Buddha and returned to you. Although you cannot see her physically, she can go wherever you go. She talks to you whenever you like, because she lives in your memory, and in your heart as a Buddha. When you close your eyes, you can hear her voice and see her smiling face, so she did not leave you alone. Let's say "Namo Amida Butsu" and write a letter to your mom in your memory."

Later she told me that she did not completely agree with what I said in class that day, however after she went home and when she opened her mom's photo album, she realized that her mother really is around her. She said, "When I saw some pictures of my mom holding me with a full smile, I felt that I was loved by her so much. Then I felt sorry that I was doubting her promise and complaining about leaving me alone. But now I know she IS living in my heart, and I really appreciate her.

The teaching of Namo Amida Butsu (Nembutsu), the teaching of Amida Tathagata often gets confused with the monastic Buddhist teachings. I don't think I would have ever achieved the state of enlightenment in the monastic way, while we all can attain it through the Nembutsu, the Jodo Shinshu way. Our Jodo Shinshu is maintained by numerous generous Sangha members of the past. Without their contributions and dedication, we could not hear this unique teaching here at the Fresno Betsuin. I hope you will attend and participate in our Eitaikyo service, November 17th, to express your gratitude to all of them. Gassho

ONAIJIN RESTORATION

As announced in the October Geppo, the Onaijin (altar area), its furnishings and the Ranmas in the foyer will be sent to Japan for restoration. Please make an effort to attend the Eitaikyo Service on November 17, 2024 to view the current altar area in its current condition for the last time. It will be gone for a period of one year, returning to us in October 2025. Believe me, when it returns, it will be so beautiful.

The Fresno Betsuin has a Eitaikyo Fund and donations are to preserve the memory of the loved one forever at the temple. But the ultimate purpose of the Eitaikyo service is to listen to the Buddha Dharma and pass it on to coming generations so that as long as human beings exist in this world, they can hear this wonderful Buddha Dharma.

The Eitaikyo Fund is controlled and used for the preservation of the temple, especially for the Onaijin. It is not to be used for general temple maintenance. It is necessary to have a temple for people to enjoy the Buddha Dharma. Although our temple building is brand new, the Onaijin is very old and in need of restoration. It costs a lot to have a major restoration. Instead of one generation bearing all the cost, each generation donates and saves money for the time when the temple needs to do restoration and now is the time to use the funds. The cost of the restoration is more than we have in the Eitaikyo Fund and we will be using other funds and also asking for assistance from the membership and friends of the Fresno Betsuin.



Rev. Kaz teaches a Two-Year Youth Buddhist Class every Friday at 6:00PM



Since 2019, four Fresno Girls, Makayla Kubo, Kylie Kubo, Izumi Ryan, and Kanon Nakata have completed the "Applied Jodo Shinshu Class", a two-year (74-hour) credit course.

This class also covers the requirement for Girl Scouts Cadettes Padma and Boy Scouts Sangha Award. Upon completion of this course, they are entitled to be a Youth Ministerial Assistant (Youth MA) for which hours of ministerial help is counted as community service. Their Youth MA title will remain until graduation from college or age 23, whichever comes first, and they can form their Buddhist club at their college. There are public speaking opportunities, not only at temple/church, but also at local communities.

The first-year class will be provided in Rev. Kaz' Dharma Center office and the second-year class will be ritual training in the Hondo.

The age requirement is 11-19 years old. No application fees required.






